CAPTAIN ROBERT SCOTT

explorer, scientist, hero

Antarctica is an enormous frozen¹ continent at the South Pole². It's very cold and windy and there's snow and ice all year. People don't live in Antarctica because the weather there is so extreme, but it's a very interesting place for scientists. They go there to study the weather and geology.

In the 1890s explorers from Great Britain, France, Germany and Norway all wanted to be the first people to reach³ the North and South poles. Captain Robert Scott was the first British man to explore Antarctica. He made two expeditions there.

Scott's first expedition began in 1901. It was a terrible journey⁴. There were strong winds and freezing temperatures. As a result, Scott and his men turned back⁵ before they reached the South Pole.

Scott wanted to return to Antarctica to reach the South Pole. He started his second expedition on 1st June 1910. There was a race between him and the Norwegian explorer Roald Amundsen to reach the South Pole first. Scott and his men arrived there on 17th January 1912, but they found a Norwegian flag and a message from Amundsen. The Norwegian explorer was the winner. He and his men arrived at the South Pole 33 days before Scott.



Scott and his men started the journey back to camp. The weather was terrible with gales and blizzards⁶. His men were cold and hungry and the journey home had a tragic end. Scott and his men died. They were only 18 km from their base camp. In November that year a search party⁷ went to Antarctica and found the bodies⁸ of Scott and his men. There was a big, memorial ceremony in London to honour them.

Captain Scott is a hero for many people in Britain. They admire him for his courage and determination. He wasn't the winner of the race to the South Pole, but he made some very important scientific discoveries⁹. He wrote diaries and took photographs, and he helped people to understand the geography, geology and extreme weather of Antarctica. There are over 30 monuments and memorials to Scott in the UK and there are books and films about his life and adventures.
